This program convenes Native American traditional healers, clinically trained service providers, and cross-cultural mental health researchers for a public Roundtable exchange. The purpose of the Roundtable is to advance professional knowledge about the integration of indigenous healing practices and conventional mental health/substance abuse treatments in community-based services for Native Americans. Each session will include individual presentations, facilitated conversation, and audience exchange with invited participants. The entire Roundtable will be video recorded.
